Through this framework, ACDICT would be looking to take an active role in influencing how such ICT-related initiatives are funded by the Australian Learning and Teaching Council and other bodies.

Overview of projects such as ALTC-funded ones that are currently in progress which are relevant to ICT learning and teaching. Discussion of possible other projects.

Sharing the passion

Sharing of local innovations, good practices and effective initiatives. Discussion of roles in learning and teaching

Hot issues

Nominations for hot issues will be called for before the meeting. Short presentations of some leading hot issues will be provided – however much of these sessions will be devoted to open discussions of issues

The national scene

Presentation(s) on the changes in the national scene that potential impact on ICT learning and teaching; discussion of the potential impact of these, e.g., TEQSA and Standards

ACDICT support framework

Discussion of a framework for ACDICT in supporting strategic national collaborative developments of ICT learning and teaching outcomes
